Incumbent's Report 2024

In my last report, I observed that 2023 was the first year since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic that our parish experienced any growth in the areas of attendance, engagement, and/or giving. I am happy to report that in 2024 we continued experience meaningful growth in all three of these areas.

I also shared in my last report my conviction that the growth we experienced in 2023 was thanks, first and foremost, to God's faithfulness to us as we remained focused on him. Once again, in preparing this report, I remain convinced that the growth we experienced in 2024 is ultimately thanks to God and the work of God's Spirit as we continued the work of helping our neighbours connect with God, grow with one another, and serve with purpose.

As we look to the year ahead, amid all the uncertainty, our purpose as a parish remains clear. Our purpose is to stay focused on helping people connect with God, grow with one another, and serve with purpose.

CONNECTING WITH GOD

Worship Attendance in 2024

I am thrilled by the fact that overall worship attendance continued to grow in 2024, because worshipping together is the main thing we do as a parish to help people connect with God.

Average Sunday Attendance in 2023:

9am Service = **12.6**

10:30am = **65.4**

(10am Summer Services = **54.4**)

Average Sunday Attendance in 2024:

9am Service = **11.2**

10:30am = **81.6**

(10am Summer Services = **61.6**)

I'm also excited to report that the number of children and youth that regularly join us for worship also increased in 2024. Unfortunately, in 2023 we neglected to record the precise number of children and youth in attendance each Sunday, but we know anecdotally that that number grew by roughly 30% in 2024.

Of course, none of our worship gatherings would be possible without the faithful service and dedication of our many volunteers. I am extremely grateful to our layreaders and readers, to our greeters and those who provide refreshments each week. I am also grateful to our tech. crew,

ushers, Sunday School volunteers, to the Rev. Deacon Debbie Cochran for the leadership she provides in our worship, and to Sharon Kelly who so diligently coordinates all these volunteers each week.

We're also blessed at St. Paul's to have several musicians and singers who eagerly share their musical gifts with us as we praise God together in song. Your willingness to share your gifts in these ways makes worshipping together not only possible but deeply meaningful and enjoyable.

Special Services and Small Group Gatherings

Of course, Sunday morning isn't the only time we gather to connect with God in prayer, worship, and reflection. Special worship services around the holidays and small group gatherings through out the year are also important times for connecting with God, and we've seen engagement grow in these gatherings as well.

Small Group Gatherings

While we have not made a habit of carefully tracking attendance numbers for the various small group gatherings that are part of the life of St. Paul's, there is strong anecdotal evidence that engagement in small groups did grow in our parish in 2024.

In the winter of 2024, we consistently welcomed 12 to 15 participants to a discussion series entitled "Love in Chaos" in which writer and speaker Bob Goff challenges and guides Christians how to respond to hostility and division with the grace and love of Jesus.

In the spring and fall 2024 we welcomed several new participants to our discussion group dedicated to watching and discussing "The Chosen" (an online series about the life of Jesus). We also welcomed several new participants to our Tuesday morning Coffee & Conversation Bible study group in 2024 as well.

In the fall of 2024, Rev. Deacon Debbie Cochran started a brand-new series of workshops dedicated to a range of Christian prayer practices and spiritual disciplines. These workshops have also helped several of our members connect with God in new and deeper ways.

Thanks so much to each and every one of our small group participants and leaders because these small group gatherings are not only vital to helping people connect with God, but are also vital to helping people grow together.

GROWING WITH OTHERS

Jesus said that the two most important things in life are loving God and loving our neighbours as ourselves. Part of Jesus' point here is that our relationship with God is inseparable from our relationship with other people, and in order to grow in our relationship with God we need to grow in our relationships with other people as well. This is why our regular small group gatherings are so important and why I am so grateful for groups like the Mothers' Union and the Holy Joes.

Mothers' Union and The Holy Joes (a.k.a. The Guild of St. Joseph)

The importance of the Mothers' Union and Holy Joes in helping the friends and members of St. Paul's grow with one another cannot be overstated. They have been integral to the life of our parish for decades. They are both headed entirely by parishioners, and they consistently provide the people of St. Paul's with valuable opportunities to not only get to know one another, but to learn and serve together as well.

I am so grateful for these groups and for all the ways they continued to bless us and help us grow together in 2024.

New Resources to Help Us Grow Together in 2025

In March of this year, several of our members will be participating in the Practicing the Way Course. This is a free series comprised of 8 sessions of teaching, guided conversation and spiritual exercises that have been designed to help people practice the way of Jesus together.

The goal of the Practicing the Way Course is to help people live as apprentices of Jesus: to be with Jesus, become like him, and do as he did. As one parishioner has already pointed out, it's kind of like the Alpha Course. However, where the Alpha Course is focused on introducing people to the basics of the Christian faith, Practicing the Way is meant to help people continue the lifelong journey of following Jesus.

The group which produces the Practicing the Way Course has also produced video and discussion material dedicated to several key spiritual practices like prayer, scripture reading, sabbath keeping, fasting, generosity, solitude and community. My hope is that our experience of the Practicing the

Way Course will prove fruitful and that we'll be able to leverage these additional resources to help more and more of our members and neighbours grow together as followers of Jesus.

SERVING WITH PURPOSE

In Ephesians chapter 2 verse 10, the Apostle Paul writes, “[W]e are God’s handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works.” Paul is reminding us that God has created and called us to bless and serve others and that it’s in serving the people around us that we continue to grow in our relationship with God and one another.

Worship Services, Community Meals, and Sacred Spaces

In my report last year, I suggested that there are 3 main ways in which we as a church serve our members and wider community:

- 1) We provide people the opportunity to connect with God in worship, prayer and spiritual reflection.
- 2) We provide people the opportunity to gather in community for fellowship and to eat together (i.e. small group gatherings, community meals, high school lunches).
- 3) We maintain and provide access to sacred spaces (namely our church building and cemetery) in which community members continue to draw near to God and to their departed loved ones.

Some would also argue that the land provided by St. Paul’s for the Hampton Community Garden is a kind of sacred space in which our community members are able to nurture their connection with creation and the land through gardening.

Together, we serve our community by providing these worship services, community gatherings, and sacred spaces, but we need to recognize that the work that goes into serving in these ways also provides our members with the opportunity to serve with purpose in a way that nurtures their own spiritual growth.

One of my biggest hopes going forward is to find new and more effective ways of inviting, welcoming, equipping and coordinating new volunteers to be a part of the work we do together at St. Paul’s. We have many very devoted volunteers who are extremely generous with their time, and yet so much more can be done to invite others into this work and share the spiritual benefits of serving with purpose together.

The Growing Challenge of Maintaining our Building

Maintaining and providing access to our building and cemetery are important services that we as a parish provide to both our members and the wider community. I am deeply grateful for the hard work

and dedication of the several volunteers who contribute their time, expertise and often their own finances to maintaining and improving St. Paul's property for the benefit of our community.

As we look ahead to the ongoing task of stewarding St. Paul's building and property, we need to face the fact that the financial costs and physical challenges of maintaining our property will continue to increase with every passing year. This means, of course, that our ability to meet these costs and challenges must grow as well. If our ability to manage and maintain St. Paul's property fails to develop and grow, maintaining our property and making it available to our community will become impossible for us.

The question of how to face the ever-increasing costs and difficulty of maintaining St. Paul's property will have a major impact on the long-term viability of our parish and it needs to be answered with both prayerful discernment and practical expertise.

One of my aims for 2025 is to bring this prayerful discernment and practical expertise together in a way that will strengthen our ability to meet the growing costs and challenges of stewarding our property effectively. However, property management is not something in which I have any practical expertise whatsoever. If you do, and if you feel called to help us in this endeavor, please let me know. We are going to need all the help we can get.

I am eternally grateful for every single person who worships with us at St. Paul's, prays for us at St. Paul's, serves with us at St. Paul's and contributes financially to the life and mission of St. Paul's. It cannot be overstated that St. Paul's simply would not be here without all of you doing all of this together.

Thanks, in particular, to our Office Administrator and Sunday Morning Ministries Coordinator, Sharon Kelly. In addition to compiling this year's annual reports, Sharon continues to tirelessly coordinate all of our Sunday morning volunteers, is a huge help with our Children's Ministry, runs the parish office and is ready to talk with, listen to and pray for anyone who might call or pop into St. Paul's during the week.

Thanks, as well to our honorary deacon, Rev. Deacon Debbie Cochran. Debbie spent most of 2024 visiting, bringing Communion to and praying with many of those who are unable to gather with us in person at St. Paul's. She also served as the Vestry clerk. Since retiring from the vocational deaconate in October 2024, Debbie has continued to serve in an honorary capacity in the parish, which includes helping in worship, and facilitating workshops on prayer and spirituality.

My thanks to Shawn Coughlan, Stephen MacMackin, Bruce Kennedy, Clarence Miller and Wayne Dollar for the work they've put in over the past year helping to maintain and improve St. Paul's building and cemetery. Thanks also to Mike Fillmore who works to keep our worship space and parish hall clean and ready to welcome people.

Thanks to the members of our Cemetery Committee: Stephen MacMackin, Alice Kennedy, Janice Kelly, Sharon Kelly, Estelle Fowler, and David Fillmore who manage and maintain the resting place of so many of our community's departed loved ones.

Deacon's Report 2024

As we begin 2025, I thank God for His direction, guidance and presence over this past year at St. Paul's. Ministry always seems to have more for us to learn and new ideas to challenge us. I am excited to see which direction God will take our church over the next year and where He wants to send us, as we continued being servants for Him.

Last January 11, 2024, I celebrated my 10 year anniversary as Vocational Deacon at St. Paul's, Hampton, N.B. I continued to meet with my Spiritual Mentor to discuss how I have been encouraged and how I have received the Holy Spirit's guidance through the Spiritual Exercise Program which now is completed. I now attend a CLC (Christian Life Community) group to continue to focus on St. Ignatius Spirituality with others who have also completed the Spiritual Exercises. This group meets bi-weekly on Sunday afternoons from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. virtually on Zoom.

I participated as the clerk (typing minutes) in our Vestry meetings, attended Deanery meetings, head up our Prayer Chain, and attend occasional meetings with Rev. David as they arise, along with involvement in the choir and our weekly worship services.

I visited the nursing/senior care homes offering home communion on a monthly basis at Daeka Care Facility, Living Hope Senior Care Home, Birch Grove Apartments, Dr. V.A Snow Center, Ossekeag Manor and the DeMille Apartments. At this time I visited 32 residents. They enjoyed a visit, participating in home communion and spending time in prayer for a loved one, friend or whomever, as the need arises. Unfortunately, I resigned from my position as Vocational Deacon at St. Paul's effective October 1, 2024, to pursue new areas of interest.

I attended a Women's Retreat at the Villa Madonna on March 9, 2024 and a Silent Retreat at the Villa Madonna from November 22-24, 2024.

On June 23, 2024 and June 30, 2024, I led and preached services while Rev. David was away in France. On August 11, 2024 and August 18, 2024, I led and preached at both services while Rev. David and his family took a well-deserved vacation. I also led services on October 20, 2024 and again on December 29, 2024.

This Fall, I began a six week Spirituality and Prayer group on Wednesday afternoons from October 23, 2024 - November 27, 2024. There were three members who took part in this group. My hope is to offer this group once again after Christmas.

Although I have resigned my position as Vocational Deacon, I still will be involved working casually, participating in worship services, meetings with David, 12-12-12, Spiritual Direction, and the CLC (Christian Life Community) group. Adding to this, I recently have joined a "Come and See Exploratory" with AASEA (Atlantic Association of Spiritual Exercises of Apostolate).

I wish to take this opportunity to personally thank Rev. David Turner and his family along with members of St. Paul's, Hampton, for your insight, direction, guidance and support, while sharing the gospel, participating in many church events and in helping those less fortunate. I look forward to the new

direction to which God may be sending each one of us and to where it will lead us in the future, in the Parish of St. Paul's, Hampton.

To the Rector, Wardens, Vestry Members and the Parishioners of the Parish of Hampton:

The Financial Audit as required by Canon SIX 2(1)(d) was completed by Dennis Stevenson and Tricia Phillips.

Our church finances remained stable due to strong financial support in 2024, thank you for your ongoing support.

In 2024 Income (giving) was \$196,770 and expenses were \$190,065 leaving a surplus of \$6,705.

In our 2024 income we had summer student governments grants for \$14,375 and NB Power grants for the new entrance window of \$2,079.

In our 2024 expenses we had Hampton Community Garden summer students for \$14,375, the new entrance window for \$4,640, energy efficiency study for the window for \$1075, and the completion of the underground electrical entrance for \$2,461.

The operating bank account ended the year at \$18,739.

As we begin our budget preparations for 2025, I raise the concern of the unknowns we face and that we need to be ready to structure our church and our finances to meet them. Weather events and energy costs continue to increase. Our infrastructure is aging and will need continued attention.

In 2025 our expense budget will be **\$172,513** with a projected **deficit of -\$3,670.**

The weekly cost to operate St. Paul's in 2025 will be \$3,318





Cemetery Committee 2024

The cemetery is managed under the Diocese of Fredericton Regulation 6-3 and administered by the Cemetery Committee which reports to the Vestry of the Anglican Parish of Hampton.

In 2023 the Diocese of Fredericton has put in new guidelines for operation of cemeteries for Parishes to follow. To meet these guidelines the following four documents were put in place in 2024:

- Contract for the Purchase and Sale of Right of Burial
- Cemetery Rules
- Cemetery Committee Responsibilities
- Cemetery Fee Schedule

The committee did the following activities in 2024 to raise the profile of the cemetery and support its ongoing maintenance:

- Memorial Service
- Collection of Recyclable Bottles
- Tree Lighting Service

The finances of the cemetery at Dec 31, 2024 are:

In total we have \$42,878.10 available for future upkeep of the cemetery. This year we were able to increase this from 2023 by \$5,538.25. Our goal is to increase this amount each year.

This year we received a grant of \$7028.35 from the Province of New Brunswick's Regional Development Corporation. This allowed us to hire the Monument Man who reset and/or repaired and cleaned 41 monuments. Thank you to Shawn Coughlan for making this happen.

Costs to maintain grave markers are the responsibility of the grave lot owner. The committee monitors all grave markers for any that pose a safety risk to the public. If repairs are made the grave lot owner is asked to pay the costs incurred.

The committee is very pleased with the results of all the work on the cemetery and how good it looks. We would like to thank John Wheaton for service in 2024.

Donations to the ongoing maintenance of cemetery by the congregation are needed and would be appreciated.

Mothers' Union 2024

Pam, Lois and Diana prepared a lovely time including games and prizes. Diana treated us to a gingerbread trifle. The day started out with snow, which had me worried, but it was fine by supper! God is good!

At the end of November, we attended a luncheon in Riverview to honour Kathleen Snow from Fredericton. She will be the next Worldwide President of Mothers' Union. We had several members attend the lunch. Videos were played from the current Worldwide President Sheran Harper and the acting Primate for Canada, the Right Rev. Anne Germond.

We decided to send letters of encouragement to our student Seveline in Uganda. A roster was created and mostly completed.

Parish Office & Administration 2024

As office administrator I have many roles and responsibilities. I come with an open heart and mind and am ready to give it my all, with God's help leading my way. When something comes up that I'm unsure of, I'll reach out to some great role models in our parish for help.

On Mondays, Rev. David and I have our weekly office meeting to touch base with each other on how things are going in the parish or what needs our immediate attention and to discuss any further details of upcoming things happening in our parish.

Also, on Mondays (or some Sundays), a volunteer from vestry comes in and counts the offerings with me. Then I enter the Sunday's offering (cash/cheques, e-Offering & Interac e-Transfers) so parishioners will receive credit for their giving's at tax time. Then I do up the weekly bank deposit and go to the bank. I enter the deposit into Quick Books. I also look after writing cheques and paying bills and post them into Quick Books.

The registration list is printed out for the greeters to use to highlight names off as people arrive on Sunday morning. Then I can enter and keep track of the attendance. Sometimes I need to reach out to parishioners who had joined the service online to see if any other family members joined in on the service with them.

I keep the Vestry book updated with the required information (services in-person and online, attendance numbers, family church, funerals, baptisms, weddings, cemetery service etc.) This past year there were three funeral services, two interments and four baptisms (and no weddings). We had two funeral receptions in the church hall.

Income tax receipts were printed, signed and given out to all our parishioners and then the others were scanned and emailed out and some were mailed. This process is very time consuming but thankfully it was a little easier this year because I just put our parishioners in an envelope and gave them out, so that saved on stamps, and I only had to mail out approximately ten receipts.

We have masks available in case someone feels the need to wear one upon entering. Hand sanitizer bottles are placed throughout the church and filled regularly, and sanitizing products are on hand. Slowly and gradually our parishioners are feeling safe to return to church, we still don't have the attendance numbers that we had before COVID-19, but it is gradually increasing each Sunday.

Thanks again to Stephen and Rev. David for your patience, encouragement, and support. Thank you from the bottom of my heart!

Sunday Morning Ministries Coordinator 2024

The major component of my job is reaching out and connecting with people daily. One focus of this position is to support the Sunday morning children's program. Ensuring that teachers are scheduled, prepared and equipped for each Sunday. Making sure that the heat is on, materials (play dough, paper) the Christ Candle and Cross and the Sunday Morning Children's Program outline is out to follow. I also keep track of attendance and keep updated contact information for families for use in supporting them and nurturing a sense of inclusion in the parish. I reach out to our Sunday school families to make sure they are aware and informed when things are happening at the church. Updated information is posted on our St. Paul's Hampton website.

The second part of my responsibilities is with Sunday morning ministries and making sure that (i.e., lay readers, readers, greeters, ushers, (office & online) zoom host, counters) are scheduled and prepared each week. I remind people about when they are on duty each week by email, messenger or by a telephone call, and this information is updated weekly into the worship schedule. When a reader or layreader reads on zoom I have someone lined up on standby in case technology doesn't work. Names are added to the Order of Service for those taking part in the service each week (now I only print the Order of Service out for those taking part in the service each Sunday. For a couple of parishioners, I print it for one to take home to share with a family member and the other to follow along with the service over the phone). I also print readings and the Psalm. I update the parish prayer list as needed and pass it along to our lay readers so that those names can be mentioned during the Prayers of the People in the service once a month. A take home copy of the Parish prayer list is available at the back of the church for people to take if they wish to.

Some folks I reach out to by phone to let them know what's happening and going on at St. Paul's. One of our parishioners follows the 10:30am worship service weekly by telephone (office), so I make sure I have someone lined up to call her and connect her. During Advent I reached out to parishioners and families to light the advent wreath for both services. During Lent and at Christmas I reached out for several readers to help with those services.

Each Sunday we have welcoming greeters at our door. The greeters welcome you in with a warm and friendly smile. We also have ushers during communion. Each week we also have a zoom host who is Joanna DiProse, she is at the comfort of her home online weekly to welcome and talk to the folks joining virtually before the service begins and track online attendance. Joanna has volunteered to call Glenna on the phone, but Glenna was having trouble hearing service so now Alice or I get Glenna on the office phone weekly. Sheri and Lorraine have volunteered to help be our zoom host if Joanna can't. Thank you, ladies!

Our Sunday morning services in 2024 are at 9am and 10:30am and summer months at 10am. Janice Kelly has volunteered to order our Easter and Christmas flowers and roses for our Cemetery Service for the rose ceremony. The flowers usually find a new home. Thank you, Janice!

Notable events:

In September we had a family service, and the kids shared what they learned about the Lord's Prayer (see Children's Ministry Report). They talked about the village pieces that represented different

aspects of the Lord's Prayer (Hospital, Church, Castle, Library, Bakery, Jail, Traffic signs, House, Nature Scene/Park) and what they mean to the congregation. Great Job Kids!

On Good Friday –during the service in the parish hall the Children and youth, explored the mystery of Holy week and Easter. We made Easter Gardens, shared the Last Supper feast, and explored the story of God's self-giving love in Jesus in a way that they can understand.

On Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, puppet plays were done by our middle and high school children. On Palm Sunday, two short puppet plays were about the betrayal, arrest, trial into Christ's passion and leading to the crucifixion. On Easter Sunday, the plays were about the crucifixion and the Prodigal Son. These were done by our middle and high school children and led by Paula Bawn.

To celebrate the season of Advent, during church we had card making, cookie decorating, advent centerpieces and ornaments. Thank you to Kate, Molly, Silas, Tricia, Freyah and everyone else that helped. Thanks to ALL!

This year we had our first Family Service to celebrate the arrival of Christmas – it was a kid-focused gathering of worship with coloring tables, songs with actions, kid-friendly bible stories, and kid-friendly communion. We introduced the Wheel of Worship - the kids spun the wheel it could land on the following: (The Lord's Prayer, Sing a Song with Actions, Sing a Hymn, Welcome Someone Next to You, Share Communion, Learn a Bible Story, Offer a "Thank you" Prayer, Offer a "Sorry" Prayer, Sing in a Round, Offer a "please" prayer, Offer a "silent" Prayer, Hear a Testimony. Children's Ministry 2024

We offer many ways for families to engage in our Sunday morning services.

In 2024 we provided 'Family Tables' for Sunday morning worship services (9am and 10:30am), with coloring and activity sheets pertaining to the readings and Sunday school lesson each week, as well as a few small toys for busy little hands and play dough.

Families also volunteered to ring the church bell at 10:15am and light the altar candles at the beginning of each service.

Sunday School programming is offered to children ages 4 to 10 and under 4 with a caregiver. The stories and the curriculum were taken from *the Jesus Storybook Bible*, *the Complete Illustrated Children's Bible*, the Godly Play series.

During our Sunday Morning Children's Program (Story Time), the children gather with an informal Welcome, Candle Lighting, Song, and a Gathering Prayer. They HEAR FROM GOD through a Bible story taken from "The Complete Illustrated Children's Bible" or "The Jesus Storybook Bible" or a Godly Play story. Each week there is an Introduction to the Story, the Story itself, some Reflection questions (What did you notice in the story? What questions do you have about the story? What might God be trying to tell us in this story?) After the wondering questions we conclude the circle time with prayer, often including the Lord's Prayer.

The children are then free to respond to the story through modeling play dough or works of art, or to connect with each other while playing with the toys until it's time to go back upstairs with their families. We go back upstairs right after the PEACE and while the song is being played. Then families receive Communion at the front of the church together.

Over the summer months, our curriculum went through the Lord's Prayer – line by line. For each line or theme, an element of a village was created to represent that theme (e.g., the bakery for "give us this day our daily bread"). At the beginning of each lesson, the children would have to find the village pieces that were hidden around the room. Each week a new line of the prayer was explored, with a Bible story relevant to that theme. We had videos of the stories and questions and song with actions to the Lord's Prayer. Snack was offered and we decorated the Lord's Prayer board and prayed the Lord's Prayer. Thank you to Molly and Kate for making our village pieces.

For youth over 10, a series was offered during the service in the church office (from April 14- June 28, two weeks on and one week off). The NUA: Origins series is an 8-part film discussion series about Christian faith and understanding faith. They watched videos and had discussion questions. The leaders were Laura Myers, Kate Turner, Paula Bawn and Erin Roy. Thank you for helping to build, deepen and to enrich their relationship with Jesus!
